

Department of Counseling, Recreation and School Psychology B.S. in Rehabilitation and Recreational Therapy: Rehabilitation Track

Program Description

The Bachelor of Science in Rehabilitation and Recreational Therapy is designed to prepare students to become competent entry-level rehabilitation professionals and recreational therapists in the cognitive (knowledge), psychomotor (skills) and affective (behavior) learning domains. The rehabilitation track prepares individuals for assistant healthcare positions within a healthcare environment or human services setting. Individuals in the rehabilitation track will meet the academic requirements for the recreational therapy CTRS credential via the equivalency path if after graduating from the track students complete 1500 hours of paid work experience that uses the TR process under the supervision of a CTRS. The courses in the rehabilitation track emphasize the broad spectrum of health care through treatment, education, and the provision of therapeutic recreation – all of which are instrumental to improving and maintaining physical, cognitive, emotional, & social functioning, preventing secondary health conditions, and enhancing overall quality of life. The rehabilitation track is suitable for students interested in graduate programs in allied healthcare professions as this track provides 30 credits of electives that could be used for prerequisite courses.

Graduation Requirements

- 1) FIU cumulative GPA of 2.0 or better on a 4.0 scale
- 2) Completion of a minimum of 120 semester hours in acceptable coursework; minimum of 45 credits must be upper division
- 3) University Foreign Language (FLENT/FLEX), Global Learning, Summer Enrollment, and Civics requirements must be met
- 4) All program and University requirements must be met

Notes

- 1) If CLP 4146 and/or HSC 3537 was taken as a transfer 1000/2000 level course, student will need to take an additional elective.
- 2) Students must get a 'C' or better in all program specific courses in order to get credit applied towards completion of degree requirements.
